








 Bates Logan Phase I construction is officially complete. Xcel energized the park this week. The restroom water was also turned on and everything is working well.

 The old train has been removed from Belleview Park in preparation to receive the new train on April 25th. Xcel is scheduled to connect power to the new service for the train next week.






 The Children's Library team taught kids all about weather! They learned about sunshine, wind, rain, hail, snow and of course rainbows!

- Englewood Recreation Center renovation update- The front desk cabinetry/millwork has been delivered and installation is this week. Mold mitigation began this week in the Colorado Room, lobby bathrooms and the Aquatics area. Doors and hardware delivered. No Asbestos was found in any areas.

- Greens & Tee aerification is complete. That's 15 acres of turf, 100 tons of sand/compost, 2000 lbs of organic fertilizer, and 500 lbs of ryegrass seed applied to these areas.



- April 13th, carts will be able to drive off the path and the golfers will be able to hit off the grass at the range. The 2024 Golf Season is upon us!
- The broken driving range pole was removed on 4/8/24. The new pole was ordered on 4/5/24 and is expected to arrive in 2-3 weeks. They were able to remove the pole without damaging the existing net. An inspection was done on the net and no damage was found!



Public Works

- South Englewood Flood Reduction Update:
 - Site A: The lining was completed last week, and the team is currently inspecting the work. The project is on track to fully reopen Oxford for eastbound traffic early next week.
 - Site B: The sanitary work on Quincy is progressing. We anticipate being able to reopen Quincy to two-way traffic later this month after the sanitary line work is done, backfilled, and paved. Excavation of the ponds is continuing, and waterline work in Stanford, east of Navajo, should commence in the coming days.
- Traffic operations will be converting the intersection of Washington and Eastman from a 2-way stop to a 4-way stop. Variable message signs (VMS) are in place notifying drivers of the upcoming change and signs (see photo below) will be installed next week.


