DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

- City Manager's Office
 - CMO staff began setting up resident focus groups for July and August in which members of the City's boards & commissions and graduates of the three citizen academies will be invited to meet with the city manager to discuss community needs and wants. Information collected will be shared with Council and the City's leadership team.
 - The City Manager's Office and Mayor Sierra were notified last week that the History Colorado State Historical Fund approved the Englewood Depot, Inc.'s application for \$248,362 for the Interior Rehabilitation of the Englewood Depot-Englewood Depot Museum-Englewood Santa Fe Railroad

Depot. The Depot board wishes to thank the City of Englewood for their support.

City Clerk's Office

- Passport services finished the month of May with a revenue total of \$12,635 servicing a total of 316 applicants. Passport availability for the month of June is very close to being completely booked.
- Board and Commission interviews will take place on Monday June 10th at 5:00 p.m. and Tuesday June 11th at 6:00 p.m. There are a total of twenty new applicants being interviewed, ten current members seeking reappointment and three alternates seeking regular positions.

- Englewood Trolley Ridership 4,860 patrons utilized the Englewood Trolley in May. 384 people accessed the service using wheelchairs.

• Finance

- o The Tax and Licensing Division update for May 2024 follows:
 - The City issued 97 <u>new</u> city sales and use tax licenses 21 in-city licenses and 76 out-of-city licenses (including several food truck and special event vendor licenses for the summer season).
 - 314 existing businesses <u>renewed</u> their city sales and use tax licenses

 84 in-city licenses and 230 out-of-city licenses. The current license renewal deficiency rate is 3.6%, well within the normal rate of deficiency.
 - Of all sales tax payments made during May, 95.30% of returns were filed timely, and 98.36% of revenue was received timely on or before the May 20th due date.

· Parks, Recreation, Library and Golf

 The Children's team in the library kicked off the Tuesday Expedition Parties by taking the Groovy Bookmobile to a Dinosaur Dig! Participants earned the Dinosaur Badge by decorating reusable bags (to protect ground water), writing thank you notes to paleontologists, digging dinosaurs out of clay, and eating snacks of dinosaur bones, rocks, and dirt.







 Summer reading is in full swing! To date there are 269 registered for summer reading: 12 babies (0-1 years), 220 children (1-11years), 37 teens (12-18 years). - Sad news to report at Broken Tee. The eagles occupying hole 13 did not have viable eggs. No eaglets hatched this year. The course has confirmed with Colorado Wildlife the course can return to normal operations on hole 13.
- o On Monday, June 3rd, *I'll Bet You Can't Pin Me Down* artwork was installed in the Civic Center Amphitheater. The artwork is by artist Justin Deister who created the piece to represent "a childhood dream of bringing a cloud down for a closer look". The artwork was purchased by the Cultural Arts Commission through the One Percent for the Arts with the intent to install it in the median at Hampden Avenue and Huron Street but due to CDOT feeling it was not the right art piece for a road median environment the artwork was instead installed on an empty pedestal in the amphitheater that had once been used by the Museum of Outdoor Arts. Public Works and PRLG staff have been working hard on making improvements to the amphitheater area in preparation for the 2024 summer concerts and events. The Cultural Arts Commission is currently working with CDOT on its application for the installation of a second piece of artwork in the median at Hampden Avenue and Bannock Street.




- ERC renovation update. Demolition of the Aquatic's training area has been completed with framing underway as of Friday.
- This week **KidConnections Summer Camp** kicked off this week. Camp is held at Colorado's Finest High School. 


• The **Englewood Summer Drama Program** kicked off rehearsals on Monday, June 3rd at Englewood High School. The Drama season kicked off with a Get-to-Know you potluck dinner before the first rehearsal.



• The City of Englewood Aquatics was audited by Jeff Ellis and Associates as part of their risk management assessment and evaluation on June 1st. The Aquatics staff received an Exceeds rating as a result of the audit, exceeding the standards set forth by Ellis and Associates. Well done!





 Both Private and Group Swim Lessons began on Monday at the Recreation Center and Pirates Cove. Formal swimming lessons can reduce drowning by 88%. Classes are available in the morning at Pirates Cove, Monday-Thursday and the Recreation extends lessons hours during the evening and on Saturday and Sunday.



- It's a been a great start to the season at Broken Tee. Revenues are up 9%, Championship rounds are up 17%, and up 23% for the Par 3 rounds!
- The first junior golf camp with 1st Tee started this week with 33 participants.
- Celebrate Golf Day is June 12-Sign up for the BBQ and activities Noon-3pm. The golf tournament has been canceled due to lack of registrations.
- Parks is fighting multiple irrigation issues right now: Cushing Park irrigation pump is out, Romans Park pump and Variable Frequency Drive (VFD) was blown last fall and the new parts just arrived and is being installed next week. A large leak at Northwest Greenbelt was discovered crews are

working diligently on it and the irrigation crew upgraded and repaired 3 valves at Belleview Park this week. Data shows these repairs are saving us close to 30,000 gallons of water a night. The Irrigation Crew also have been tending to repairs at Jason Park, Bates Logan, and adjusting zones and times as hot weather has arrived.

Police

o Police Department Staff (Deputy Police Chief Vance Fender) and Public Works Staff (Traffic Engineer Adam Maxwell) have worked with Representatives of Swedish Medical Center to relieve many of the traffic safety issues around their facility. Some of these issues include speeding vehicles, pedestrian safety, and parking issues. Signage in the area has been updated so that it is better defined and is now posted on Hampden Ave ("Old Hampden") consistently at 20 mph from South Logan Street east to South Ogden Street. Additional signage on the east end of this location has been added to clarify the 25 mph speed zone between South Ogden Street and South Lafayette Street. Additionally, the Police Department Traffic Enforcement Unit is spending more time in the area on proactive enforcement and parking management. These traffic safety concerns have been an ongoing topic for the community for quite some time and have been discussed in a variety of forums to include a meeting we had with State Representative Meg Froelich. This is an excellent example of our continued partnership with Swedish Medical Center and with the neighboring business and residential community.

• Public Works

- South Englewood Flood Reduction Update:
 - Site A: Work is complete, and staff are processing the last pay app. This will be the last update on this site in the Friday report.
 - Site B: The diesel contaminated soils in the Pond B area are continuing to present a challenge. Staff are working to line up environmental testing to make sure all bases are covered. The tunneling machine is en route with tunneling operations tentatively starting around the week of June 17th. Some third-party relocations (Lumen) and removals (Xcel) are underway to clear the area for us in the project area.
- The Public Works Traffic Operations team is reviewing how our traffic signals operate when the power goes out and comes back on. This is commonly known as a flashing signal / when a traffic signal goes into fault mode for some reason. The Manual for Uniform Traffic Control (MUTCD) states that an all-red flash (meaning all approaches in the flash condition are flashing red) is the recommended practice. The team is currently

- working alongside a contractor to update all signals in the city to conform to this best practice.
- o Dartmouth Bridge Update: Wires over the bridge are being taken down this week. This has been a long time coming and it means Xcel is now (mostly) out of our way. Pier 4 is complete, and the west bank has been cleared to allow for the crane pad. A new pump has been installed to pump water out of the Pier 3 cofferdam which was holding us up, so we are now able to finish Pier 3. Construction on the crane pad for Pier 2 construction will begin next week. Pier 2 should be completed within a month or so. The signal at the West intersection of the bridge will need to be converted to a 4-way 4-head signal to allow clearances needed to complete work on Abutment 1 which will occur in the next 3 to 4 weeks. 
